

WHAT IS SELF-RELIANCE?

"Self-Reliance" is a country's ability to plan, finance and implement solutions to its own development challenges.



WHAT DETERMINES SELF-RELIANCE?

Commitment: Choices / Behaviors

How well a country's laws, policies, actions, and informal governance mechanisms -- such as cultures and norms -- support progress towards self-reliance



Capacity: Achievement / Outcomes

How far the country has come in its journey across the dimensions of political, social, and economic development, including the ability to work across these sectors





As Commitment and Capacity strengthen, so does overall Self-Reliance

HOW IS USAID RE-ORIENTING AROUND THE CONCEPT OF SELF-RELIANCE?

- Establish clear and objective metrics that will allow USAID to track host country progress and inform development strategies.
- Strengthen USAID's **private sector engagement and innovative financing** approaches to achieve greater results in the field.
- Partner with governments to develop effective, transparent, and accountable systems to better-mobilize domestic resources that allow them **to finance self-reliance**.
- Ensure our country relationships are firmly rooted around advancing self-reliance
- Develop a thoughtful and purposeful approach for transitioning to **new partnership models** when countries achieve advanced levels of self-reliance

SELF-RELIANCE METRICS

The **Self-Reliance Metrics** are an analytical tool to:

- Understand where countries are on their Journey to Self-Reliance
- Plot the overall Journey
- Inform decisions on country strategies
- Consider countries for possible strategic transition conversations




Capacity of the Government

- Capacity of Citizens Poverty Rate (World Bank) Education Quality (IRED) Child Health (CIESIN)
- 4. Capacity of Economy Per Capita GDP in PPP (World Bank) Diversification of the Export Sector (UNCTAD) ICT use (WEF)

COUNTRY ROADMAPS

- Roadmaps provide a visualization of self-reliance for a country -- where it is in the Journey overall, and where strengths and challenges are
- Organized around the two Self-Reliance categories of "Commitment" and "Capacity"
- Will be produced annually for all low- and middle-income countries
- We anticipate making them publicly available in the Fall (October 2018)






0-I Score

What will the Roadmaps and Metrics be used for?



- Seeing where a country is on its journey to self-reliance
- Development dialogue, as appropriateTo inform high-level strategic planning efforts
- As a signal for when to consider closer examination for strategic transition

What will the Roadmaps and Metrics **not** be used for?



- As a standalone "red light / green light" determinative tool
- As a sort of competitive "scorecard" (ala MCC)
 "Infallibly" secondary / supplemental information will be key, and the indicators will need to be continually reviewed and improved
- To measure progress on specific USAID projects/activities
